Discussion Leader: Sidney Drell

This session will focus on the major changes in political/strategic factors over the past two decades:

- The roles and missions of nuclear weapons, offensive and defensive systems, and prospects for nuclear nonproliferation and the NPT.
- Progress on human rights, bilateral U.S.-Russian relations, and dealing with regional issues.
- The spread of technology to newly emerging nations; and the intertwining of nuclear technology for civilian power and economic development with that for weapons, which presents serious intelligence challenges, and is making the nonproliferation regime more difficult to preserve.
- The rise of terrorism seeking nuclear weapons, the growing cooperation among the nuclear powers against the terrorist threats, and the role of international organizations and controls on nuclear fuel.

This discussion will be structured around specific national programs or geographic regions (i.e. North Korea, India and South Asia, Iran and the Middle East), focusing on how Reagan's ideas about nuclear weapons affected the way those changes were addressed or whether his ideas were not pursued by his successors as they faced new challenges.
